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1.0 Introduction

How well you prepare will determine your overall travel success while visiting Costa Rica. We at Zen Commando are here to assist throughout all stages of your Costa Rica trip. Everyone has different degrees of travel experience, some more experience than others, so we understand any questions or concerns you may have pertaining to travel to Costa Rica. Additionally, the coronavirus pandemic has contributed to an increase in confusion, stress, and anxiety, so we are here to assist your travel needs.

The following information is provided to assist with planning and executing your travel. PLEASE READ CAREFULLY, particularly the section **Travelers Insurance**.

2.0 About Camp Zen Commando (CZC)

Camp Zen Commando (CZC) is a mind-body adventure and performance camp located in the foothills near Dominical, Costa Rica on the Pacific Coast... one of Costa Rica's premier surf destinations. CZC rests on three acres and is surrounded by pristine beauty that includes lush tropical forests, flowing streams, and bountiful fruits and vegetables. What makes CZC special is the peace, beauty, and solitude of the location. Within a short walking distance, there is full access to numerous swimming holes and waterfalls as well as a nature preserve with countless hiking trails and scenic vistas. The camp amenities include a fitness facility with weights, wifi, the main facility for dining, and a guesthouse for lounging, and sleeping.



3.0 Traveling to Camp Zen Commando

Traveling to Costa Rica and Camp Zen Commando is simple and one of our goals is to make getting to CZC as easy as possible. The majority of U.S. airlines provide non-stop flights from major hubs. Miami, Houston, Los Angeles, Dallas, Charlotte, and New York / Newark are a few of the major U.S. cities that directly serve either San Juan Santamaria International Airport in San Jose or Daniel Oduber International Airport in Liberia in the northern part of Costa Rica. Because traveling to Costa Rica might be the first time for you, we will assist as much as possible to make your travel as simple as possible, but *please* keep in mind, the infrastructure is not as developed and high-tech as in the U.S., Canada, and other places, *so manage your expectations to avoid unnecessary anxiety.*

4.0 Pre-Travel

4.1 Plane Ticket Purchase

Due to logistics, it is imperative you plan your arrival and departure flights accordingly. If you are attending a training course or retreat, ensure you plan to arrive at Camp Zen Commando between 1:00 pm and 5:00 pm on the first day of the course, or as directed. For planning your departure flight, please ensure you do not schedule a departure flight any sooner than 1:00 pm Costa Rica local time. This will provide enough time for ground transportation to get you from Camp Zen Commando to the airport for your check-in and security checks.

4.2 Passport and Visa Requirements

- You need to have at least six (6) months of validity on your passport to travel outside the continental U.S.
- Depending on the airline you travel and the agent checking into your flight the agent might ask to see your return flight details to the U.S. Please have them accessible.
- Visa Requirements – All U.S. Passport Holders receive a 90-day Visa on Arrival (no action required)



4.3 Enroll in STEP

The Smart Traveler Enrollment Program (STEP) is a free service to allow U.S. citizens and nationals traveling and living abroad to enroll in their trip with the nearest U.S. Embassy or Consulate.

- Enrollment in STEP is **NOT mandatory** to visit Costa Rica but it does provide the embassy your information in case a situation arises and you require embassy assistance

4.4 Banking

- Ensure you notify your bank of your international travel so there isn't a hold imposed on your card (s) when you use them for the first time in-country
 - Most banks offer this service online
- The number and type of cards are dependent on your needs and requirements. **CommandoTip:** A recommended guideline is to carry (1) x debit card, (1) x primary credit card, (1) x backup credit card

4.5 Travelers Insurance

It's important you purchase the right type of travel insurance before coming to Costa Rica, or when traveling abroad. Basic insurance tends to cover medical expenses, baggage loss, trip cancellation, accidents, and personal liability, but it's worth spending extra to make sure you're covered in the event of natural disasters. If you intend to take part in adventure sports, make sure that those particular sports are covered by your policy; for divers, some policies only cover you up to a certain depth.

4.6 Helpful Mobile Device Applications

Downloading the below applications can assist with your travel throughout the country

- *Uber*. Uber does operate in the more populated dense areas, so it is recommended that you use Uber when traveling in the vicinity of San Jose, especially to and from the airport. Rates do tend to be a bit more effective than taxi cabs.
- *WhatsApp*. WhatsApp is a communications tool that works on a wifi connection. The majority of people in Costa Rica rely on WhatsApp to communicate with one another. It is highly advised that you download WhatsApp prior to departing your point of origin and perform a communications check with a representative from Camp Zen Commando (See Section 15.0)
- *Currency convertor*. A currency converter will assist you in converting local currency into USD in a more timely manner. The majority of establishments do accept USD, credit cards, and debit cards. ATMs are available throughout the country and offer English and Spanish options.
- *Waze*. Waze is a GPS navigation software app owned by Google. It works on smartphones and tablet computers that have GPS support. It provides turn-by-turn navigation information and user-submitted travel times and route details while downloading location-dependent information over a mobile telephone network. Many vendors in Costa Rica use Waze for navigation purposes.

5.0 Electronics

5.1 Mobile Devices

- Contact your cellular provider/carrier to determine the type of roaming and international services they offer
 - ATT offers a \$10 / day unlimited data and cell usage plan for Costa Rica travel and other areas in the world



- An ATT customer can access their wireless account online and easily enable this feature for the period of travel. Remember, to disable the feature upon completion of travel or ATT will continue to charge you for the period enabled.
- Whatsapp is the most popular method for communicating in Costa Rica due to wifi access at the majority of establishments.
 - **ProTip:** Download Whatsapp onto your mobile device and perform a communications check with the designated Zen Commando rep
- A SIM card can be purchased in-country and used with an *unlocked phone*. Ensure your mobile device is unlocked if you want to “pay as you go.”
- ***Due to location, there is no cellular service at Camp Zen Commando. Wifi is available for you to use to communicate via WhatsApp, Facebook Messenger, or other***

5.2 Computers and Tablets

- Avoid traveling with extra electronics unless absolutely necessary - they are just extra items you have to account for everywhere you travel. If you decide to bring your computer, ensure there is no sensitive information saved on your computer that may be stolen by a hacker.
- Avoid accessing any type of sensitive account, e.g. bank accounts, business accounts, etc., while using public wifi hot-spots to reduce the risk of computer cyber-attack.
- DO NOT leave electronics unattended or in view in a locked vehicle

6.0 Currency

Costa Rica’s currency is the colon (₡), named after Christopher Columbus. It comes in both paper and coin form. The paper money ranges from bills of ₡1,000 (called a “mil” (Spanish for 1,000) or “un rojo” because of the bill’s red color) to ₡50,000. Coins range from an almost valueless ₡5 to ₡500 (“quinientos” (Spanish for 500)) and are quite heavy for the higher denominations.



6.1 Exchange Rate

The exchange rate fluctuates daily but usually factors to between ₡650-680 per USD. To provide an example, if an item costs ₡1,250, it is a little less than \$2.50. An easy way to think of it is to double the amount in colones and move the decimal point.

Here are the most common bills and their estimated USD equivalent using this method:

₡1,000 is about \$2.00

₡2,000 is about \$4.00

₡5,000 is about \$10.00

₡10,000 is about \$20.00

₡20,000 is about \$40.00

*Note the higher the bill, the less exact the calculation with the above formula. For example, if the current exchange rate is ₡550 for each dollar, a ₡20,000 bill will equal only about \$35 instead of \$40.

In addition to colones, US dollars are widely accepted throughout the country, though it is best to have some local currency to use just in case.

ATMs are the most reliable method to get money. It is normal to get alarmed when using an ATM machine abroad, but the ATMs in Costa Rica are as safe to use as anywhere in the U.S.

You can get local currency from an ATM as long as you've authorized your card for use internationally. ATM machines can be found throughout Costa Rica and in most tourist destinations.

Some of the banks in Costa Rica recently started limiting ATM withdrawals for people with foreign ATM/debit cards. Banco de Costa Rica (BCR) and Banco Nacional now allow foreign account holders to take out only ~\$100 per transaction or ~ \$200 per day if you do two transactions. You can still go into the bank to withdraw money, but of course, this is less convenient.



Either plan to bring a little more cash with you or use other banks' ATMs, which do not have the same limits. The other thing to keep in mind is foreign transaction fees. Most banks in Costa Rica, with the exception of BCR, charge a fee for use of their ATM machine. In addition to that, you might get charged from your home bank for using an out-of-network machine and also foreign currency conversion fees for taking out local currency. Check with your bank before you leave about the different fees

6.2 Credit Cards

One convenient aspect of traveling in Costa Rica is that credit cards are widely accepted. It is preferred to use a credit card (or debit card for purchases) whenever possible because you know you're getting the correct conversion and it's nice not to carry a lot of cash on your person. Many restaurants, hotels, gas stations, and tour operators accept credit so be sure to ask.

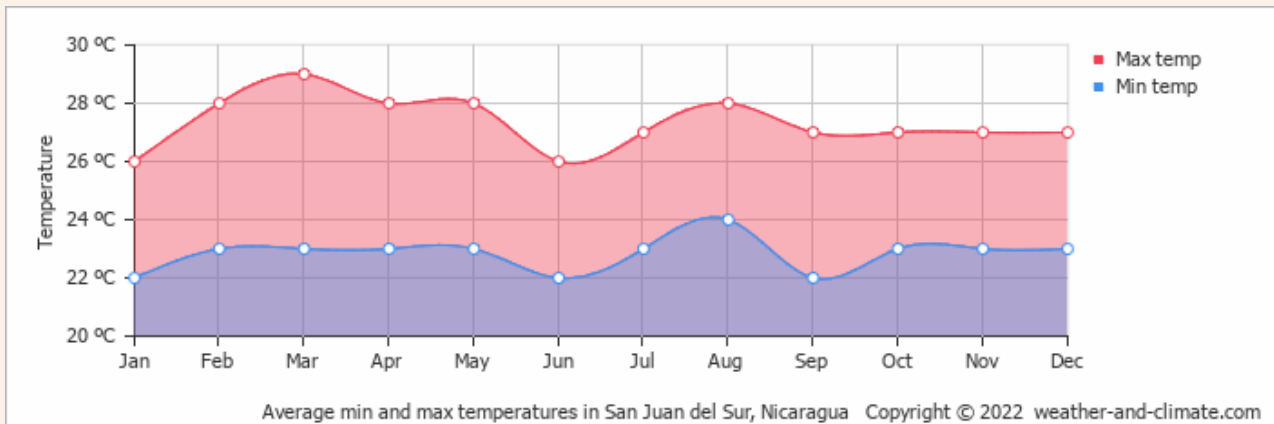
ProTip: Be sure to authorize your credit card for international use so your bank doesn't flag your account for fraud when you use it. Also, ask your bank about its fees for foreign transactions so that you don't have any surprises when you return home. These charges typically range from 1-3% of the total transaction amount. Credit unions tend to have the lowest fees. If you travel out of the country frequently, consider getting a travel credit card, which doesn't have fees for international purchases.

7.0 Weather

- On average, the temperatures are in the 80's and 90's with high humidity... typical of tropical weather
- The Rainy season is considered to be between late May and November with the heaviest rains occurring between September and November. Though these months are the rainy season, generally, the mornings are clear with rainfall beginning in the afternoon and lasting until the evening.



- On average, the warmest month is March.
- On average, the coolest month is October.
- October is the wettest month. This month should be avoided if you don't like too much rain.
- February is the driest month.



8.0 Airport Information

Juan Santamaría International Airport (SJO) is located on the outer fringe of San Jose, Costa Rica's capital city. The airport has gone through plenty of improvements over the past few years and is renovated regularly to keep up with the increasing growth rate of the economy.

- Free WiFi is available for your convenience, but don't rely on it.
- There are ATM machines located in the baggage claim area so you can withdraw cash to enable paying for services during your visit.

8.1 Arriving at SJO

- On Aircraft. On flights to some countries, you will receive a custom form to claim any items or articles you are bringing into the country. *Effective as of 2019, Costa Rica does not require a customs form to be completed unless you are bringing in excess of \$10,000 USD, carrying agricultural products, or other items required to be claimed.*
- At Arrival Gate. Debarck Aircraft
- Pass through Immigration Desk



- Follow signs to Immigration checkpoints to get your passport stamped.
 - *You will be required to show proof of exit from Costa Rica.*
 - Proceed through Immigration checkpoint to Baggage claim
 - *If asked where you will be staying, provide the following address:*
 - *Laguna Savegre A La Par de Quebrada, Sea Breeze Farms, Savegre, Puntarenas*
- Retrieve and procure baggage at baggage claim
- **ProTip.** An ATM is located near the baggage claim. This is a good opportunity to withdraw local currency for any forthcoming expenses
- **ProTip.** Log onto airport Wifi and if necessary or required, notify Zen Commando representative of your status
- Proceed to customs after retrieving baggage
 - Provide customs form to the attendant
 - Place luggage on the x-ray belt
- Pass through customs to Terminal Exit

9.0 Getting to Camp Zen Commando

Dominical is the destination for follow-on transportation to CZC. Please remember, you are responsible for arriving at Dominical/CZC the day prior to the first training day, so give yourself plenty of time between movements and plan accordingly.

There are two primary options for getting to Camp Zen Commando:

9.1 Option 1: Air > Air > Ground - Fast & Efficient

Option 1 consists of three phases that involve traveling to San Jose, Costa Rica via a major air carrier, taking another commuter plane from SJO to Quepos, and then finally proceeding to Camp Zen Commando via ground.





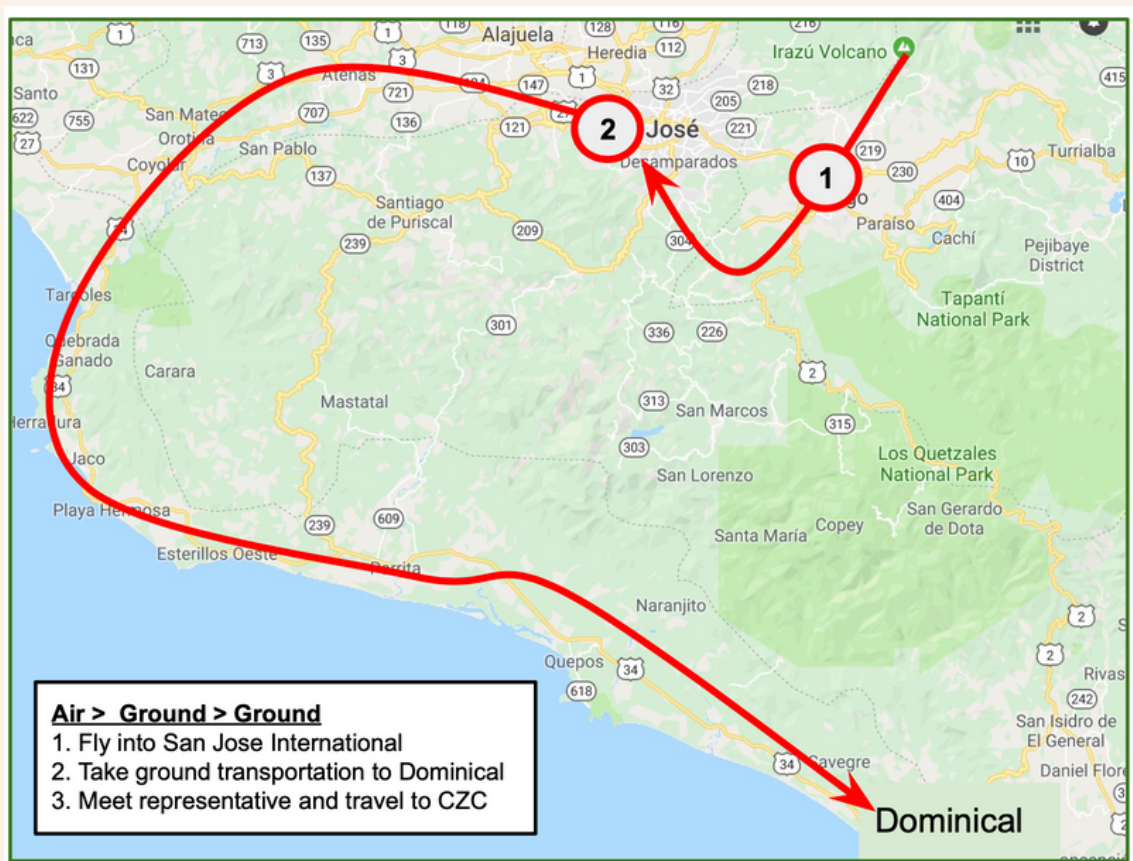
- Air. Fly into San Jose airport (SJO)
- Air. Take a commuter flight to Quepos via Sansa (www.flysansa.com) or Nature Air (www.natureair.com)
- Ground. Upon arriving in Quepos, you have three options to get to Dominical. You can take either a taxi, rental vehicle, or bus to pick you up directly at the Quepos airport. Once at Dominical, a representative will meet you and bring you to the camp.
 - Taxi. Costs approximately \$40 USD and can be accessed in the vicinity of the Quepos airport. You can also use a transport provider listed in Section 14.0
 - Rental. You can rent a car in Quepos but prices tend to be high due to insurance requirements. You will also be required to have a 4x4 to negotiate the road into camp. We do not recommend renting a vehicle if attending a course.



- Bus. Buses run regularly from Quepos to destinations all over Costa Rica. A bus stop is located near the Quepos airport and will cost approximately \$4 USD to get you to Dominical. Be advised, there is no set schedule listed for bus routes, but you can ask someone from a nearby store or another for possible times.

9.2 Option 2: Air > Ground - Slow & Scenic

Option 2 is a two-phase movement process that involves traveling to San Jose, Costa Rica via air and then taking ground transportation to Dominical for a follow-on movement to Camp Zen Commando.



- Upon arriving at SJO you have three ground movement options to get to Dominical where a representative will meet you for travel to camp.
 - Bus. Most preferred. A bus ticket to Dominical costs approximately \$8.00 and departs from the main Tracopa Station at Plaza Viquez / Avenida which is located [HERE](#)
 - You will have to take a taxi, or uber, from the airport to the Tracopa Bus terminal, and traffic dependent, it can take upwards of an hour to get to the bus terminal, so plan accordingly.
 - The Tracopa bus schedule is located [HERE](#). When using the site and finding times of departure, the name of the place of origin is "Saint Joseph" and the name of the destination is "Uvita." Plan on arriving at the bus terminal 45 -60 minutes prior to ensure you get a ticket.
- Upon arriving in Dominical, a representative will meet you for a follow-on movement to CZC.
- The trip to Dominical takes approximately 3.5 to 4.0 hours.
- Please remember to arrive at CZC the day prior to Training Day One
- Rental Car. Depending on your overall Costa Rica itinerary, you can rent a car and drive directly to Camp Zen Commando. Rental cars tend to be slightly expensive due to the insurance requirements imposed by the rental agencies. You will also require a 4x4 variant to access the roads to get to Camp Zen Commando. This is not the preferred option unless you plan on touring the country before or after your stay at CZC.
- Shuttle. You can arrange for a shuttle arranged to take you from SJO to Dominical where you will then be met by a representative to take you to camp. Travel time to Dominical is approximately 3.5 to 4.0 hours and prices range vary from ~60.00 and higher per person. A list of shuttle services is provided in Section 14.00



10.0 Security and Safety

10.1 Background

Costa Rica is a safe and friendly country, but because it continues to be a developing Latin American country, conditions will be different from the US, Canada, and Europe. Costa Rica lies between the biggest drug-producing country (Colombia) and biggest drug consuming country (USA) in the Americas; therefore, a steady flow of drugs from South to North through Latin America does exist, but the majority of trafficking in the vicinity of Costa Rica is done offshore via maritime vessels and other methods.

Opportunistic theft and drug-related crime are the most popular types of crime, so remaining alert and vigilant is crucial. The below are general universal guidelines and measures that can be considered when traveling abroad, not only in Costa Rica.

10.2 Travel Guidelines and Best Practices

- Apart from cash, items such as iPhones, iPods, cell phones, credit cards, laptops, cameras, jewelry, and passports are the “hot” items. So carry as little as possible and leave your valuables at home or in a safe where you are staying.
- After dark, it's much better to take a taxi instead of walking or using a bike
- Public intoxication or buying drugs will attract unwanted attention. Just realize, anybody buying drugs is part of the problem.
- Avoid carrying too much money on your person, and if you must, have a small amount in your pocket and put the main amount safely hidden
- Avoid wearing your expensive mobile device or camera around your neck.
- Leave your passport in your safe, carry a hard copy, or keep a photo on your mobile device
 - You do require a copy of the page with your photo and a copy of the page with the entry stamp



- Avoid bringing valuables to the beach. Select a location where you can have someone you trust to look after your belongings when going into the water. Theft of unattended belongings at public beaches is common.
- Avoid leaving valuables unattended in your car. Place valuable items in the trunk. **ProTip.** Avoid others seeing you placing your valuables in the trunk.
- Don't buy drugs and if drugs are offered, avoid further engagement with the person - walk away to a safe and secure location
- Being intoxicated makes you an easy victim
- Travel in groups, avoid traveling alone; travel in pairs
- If you do become a victim, ask for help and take the help that is offered and report; every correctly made report will help make this a better destination
- **ProTip.** For your mobile phone, make sure you copy the IMEI code, which gives you the possibility to make your phone useless for a thief. The IMEI code will also assist authorities to track your device.
- **ProTip.** AVOID logging into sensitive accounts in public wifi areas. Cyber hackers prey on tourists and the acquisition of sensitive information over unsecured networks is simple to perform.

11.0 Helpful Tips

- Be RESPECTFUL to everyone. This includes being considerate, kind, helpful, friendly
- Avoid being RUDE. You represent where you come and *“what you project is what you reflect...”*
- Be PATIENT
- Dress appropriately when conducting business in official locations, e.g., municipal buildings, banks, government agencies, et al.
